Child Protection:

The Church's Code of Practice

he Church of Scotland has produced a Code of Practice on 'the Protection of Children and Young People in the Church'. The code is designed to protect children in two ways:

- by ensuring the screening of people who wish to work with children in a church setting
- by advising those responsible for children on what to do if a child begins to tell them about abuse

The Policy Statement - The Church's policy statement on the protection of children is displayed in the Church and on noticeboards in and about the halls. It is important that all church members are aware of it.

Child Protection Co-ordinator - Each Church has to appoint a Child Protection Co-ordinator and our Kirk Session has appointed **Olive Lyall (552 5837)** to this task. Olive has to keep a record of all people in positions of responsibility for children under 16 - e.g. in Sunday School, Crèche and BB's. All future volunteers for these activities will be required to complete a form, provide a reference and undertake basic training in child protection.

It is not as onerous as it might sound and although this might seem bureaucratic, it is designed to deter abusers who in the past have found it easy to have contact with children as unchecked volunteers. Our Co-ordinator is also required to make sure that all non-church organisations using our halls are aware of our policy on Child Protection.

The Church's policy arises, in part, from concerns about the tragedy at Dunblane and the events preceding it. We all like to think "it couldn't happen here" - but it could, and the Church is putting in place some simple precautions which should at the least reduce the

n Sunday 6th September at 6.pm, about 90 people gathered in the East Hall to sing. We were singing from 'Common Ground' a new ecumenical songbook for the churches. It was a great evening when we sang songs from all over the world and from different religious traditions. We sang in three parts and in four part rounds, although no-one took up the offer to sing solo!

It was a good social occasion too! As the songbook is ecumenical we decided to invite people from the other denominations in the Parish to join us and also people from the Churches in the Greater Pilton area.

Why do we need a new hymnbook? The words of a hymn reflect the hymnwriter's experience of God. A hymn will be influenced by the time, place and culture in which the writer lived. There will therefore be some hymns which use images and pictures and words which mean very little, if anything, to the people of today.

If people stopped writing hymns we would be saying that we had nothing of our own and nothing new to offer to God in worship. We

Tide of Interest for songbook for all

-ommon

Some people call it "Pebbles", others call it the amazing publishing phenomenon. "Common Ground", the ecumenical song book launched in April by church leaders in Dunblane, is selling in thousands. The first music book of its kind in Europe, it has sold 5000 in the music version and 14,000 in the words. Its distinctive

would be left with an understanding of God that is very narrow and reflective only of a particular time. We must allow our understanding and experience of God to change, develop and grow, and be reflected in our worship.

The book is called 'Common Ground' because the Churches of all denominations share a common heritage and we can make the best of the new and the old songs also part of that heritage. For us in the Church of Scotland, 'Common Ground' does not replace our traditional hymnbook but adds to our resources for worship rather like 'Songs of God's People' has done until now.

By the time you read this, the Kirk Session will have made a decision on whether or not to buy this book for our church. I hope they decide to do so. It can only enhance our worship.

Worship is the only thing that the Church does that no other institution or organisation does. We must do it well so that the people of this Parish might have their own experience of God.

he issue of homelessness has featured in our worship recently. As you may be aware the Edinburgh Churches millenium project is tackling the problem of homelessness in our city.

The project was launched last year and since then it has made significant

progress towards the goal of eliminating homelessness. The most obvious sign has been 'Fresh Start', which has been developed in partnership with the Scottish Churches Housing Agency.

'Fresh Start' offers practical support to those who have been homeless and have just recently been housed.

This is where we can help in a number of practical ways. Fresh Start is seeking help with three intiatives:

Starter Packs for those who have been homeless.

 a) Donations of household goods which are made up into packs of crockery, cutlery, pots, pans and cleaning materials are needed.

We need a contact in our Church who could organise a collection for the Starter Packs. Anyone willing to volunteer should contact the Minister.

Look out for further information on this in the weekly notices in Church.

b) Volunteers also needed to assist in one of the packing stations in Pilton or Slateford.

and finally..., I told this story at the morning service on 6th September and I think it's well worth printing here:

Hear our prayer, by Elizabeth O'Connor, Cry Pain, Cry Hope

[One evening] I was part of the volunteer staff of an ovenight shelter for street women. It was a very cold night and the women began to arrive early in the evening. The rooms reserved for them were behind the sanctuary of the church and were used for other purposes during the day. Foam rubber mats were laid out over the entire area in one room. Many of the women chose a mat as soon as they arrived. Some had very little with them, though most of them had the bags that had given them the name of bag ladies. One carried her possessions in a child's wagon, and another, more affluent, had hers piled dangerously high in a supermarket cart. The conversation was disconnected, but the atmosphere was warm and peaceful. Each one was given a bowl of stew, bread and tea...

When morning came the peaceful

atmosphere inside the shelter turned hostile. Distraught women - some of them old and sick - could not comprehend why they were once more being `pushed out' into the streets. We who had received them so warmly the night before were the very ones hurrying them along, benefactors so soon to become enemies.

In the narrow hall where the women were having breakfast, an old woman with a gentle face kneeled to pray. She was in the way of another woman who taunted her "Get up woman. God don't hear your prayer" The praying woman did not respond and her taunter said again, "God don't hear your prayer woman. God don't hear your prayer."

I asked myself, "Does God hear her prayer?" Then I remembered. God is in me and where I am God is. The real question was, "Did I hear her prayer?"

What would it mean to hear her prayer?

We have recently begun to use your East Hall and would like to express our appreciation for the wonderful floor which is so kind to our bare feet, and also to tell you a bit about ourselves since you may find that you too are an Edinburgh Egyptian Dancer.

We are a non-profit making organisation set up to help all those Egyptian dance fanatics in and around Edinburgh to pursue their obsession to the ultimate in the company of other enthusiasts.

We are a group of women with a common passion for Egyptian dancing. We are not professional dancers. We are students, teachers, children's workers, architects, wives, mothers, and grandmothers. ranging in age from 20's to 60's.

As our enthusiasm for the dance grew, attending classes was not enough, so, we fomed a practice group and hired space

where we could dance together and develop performance pieces to present publicly. We make most of our own costumes and a large part of the enjoyment is dressing up and expressing our femininity in a way that is not possible in our "real" lives.

We formed a group in 1994 and began to dance at local events, private parties and restaurants. We presented regular weekend performances at Cafe Graffitti during the Edinburgh Festivals of 1994 & 1995 and in 1996 & 1997 we hosted Haflas (Egyptian Ceilidhs) in conjunction with 'Assembly Alive'. We have been invited by them to organise a similar event on Friday 20th November this year. Preparations for this Hafla are well under way so you should book now through the Assembly Rooms Box Office if you want to secure a ticket!
