

n 5th August, 1981, an IRA car bomb blew the centre of Lisburn (Northern Ireland) apart. It severely damaged not only shops and offices, but the old Presbyterian Church . Cracks appeared in the walls; plaster from the gallery fell off into the pews; the ceiling timbers cracked - but perhaps worst of all was the damage to the church's seventeen stained glass windows. Some were very valuable, and most had been blown to pieces.

Repairs took six long years. During that time it became clear that some pieces of glass could not be set back in the restored windows and a new idea began to form. The church would literally 'pick up the pieces' and create a new window, a Resurrection Window. It was to represent an explosion; not the exploding bomb, but the energy of Resurrection - life exploding from death, hope from despair, light from darkness, love from hatred.

In the centre of the window is an orb representing the world, surrounded by red to show suffering. But from the centre, bright beams of light shoot out, representing the way in which the church, town and indeed the whole community in Northern Ireland, has time after time risen again from destruction. Lisburn's town crest includes the Latin words 'Ex Igne Resurgam' which means 'I will arise from the fire.' The new window was dedicated in May 1987.

In 1988 the three hundredth anniversary of the installation of the church's first minister, plans were made for special events and

services, and the renovation and development of the church halls for the future. Money-raising started and work got underway. The scheme was due to be finished by

December 15th 1989.

But on Thursday 7th December, the IRA struck again. The porch was layered with glass, walls cracked, plaster fell down from the gallery and the pews were pitted with thousands of glass fragments. Two protected windows remained intact, but the rest lay in twisted, crumpled bundles of glass and lead. The Resurrection Window had been ripped out by the blast and was found wrapped round a pillar in the gallery.

The church began to clear up - first for worship on Sunday, then the work of restoration. There was support from local

ministers, Catholic and Protestant, many phone calls and letters, and offers of money. The church was vacated at the end of February for work to begin and amazingly it re-opened for a wedding on Easter Saturday and the Easter services, although other work continued into June. The Resurrection Window was the first to be restored.

New community groups now meet in the church, offering care for people with mental health problems, education, counseling, a friendship club and a 'cross community' group with a nearby Roman Catholic Church.

Gordon Gray, the church's minister at the time wrote " This time we left the scars gouged in the Communion Table by flying glass. They remind us of the wounds of Christ. We have experienced a little of the suffering of crucifixion. But we have lived a Resurrection, by that same power that raised Christ from



Deed of Covenants 【 對 Making your Offerings Grow

by Stewart Greig, Deed of Covenant Convenor

Tax at the standard rate? Whether you pay tax on a pension or a salary you could add to your offerings to the Church without it costing you a penny. For every £1 that you give to Granton Parish Church as an offering, the Inland Revenue would add 29p – simply by you taking out a "Deed of Covenant".

Is it really as simple as that?

Yes - every £1.00 that you give to the Church is worth £1.29 because we can recover that tax that you have already paid on that pound! No amount is too small (or too large) providing that it is covered by a legal document called a "Deed of Covenant", and it is recorded by Granton Parish Church for a period of 4 vears.

Will this affect my Tax Code?

It will not in any way affect your code number, but would have to be advised if or when you have to make an Income Tax return.

How long do I have to commit for?

The covenant stops after 4 years - at which point of course we would hope

that you would agree to continue on for another 4 years – but it would also stop on the prior death of the covenantor. Should your circumstances change during the 4 year period making you unable or ineligible to comply with the requirements laid down, then discontinuation of the claim by the Church would result in no penal action being taken by the tax authorities.

How can I make payments?


Contributions can be made by weekly offering envelopes, a monthly standing order or a single payment.

How much is it worth to the Church?

Last year we claimed over £3,000 for Granton Church, but have suffered in the loss of a number of covenanters and the claim for this year is likely to be less. The Treasurer's report for 1999 and the budget for 2000 predict that we are projected to have a loss of over £4,000 in our total income.

How can I find out more?

Please consider your own position carefully. There have been a number of income increases in recent years - for


